New Trails, Better Signage, More Recreation – Oh My!

While the trails may not be paved with yellow brick, user groups from all across the city are ecstatic that their wishes for enhanced river amenities are beginning to come true.


Construction crews have begun work along the Trinity River between University Dr. and Rogers Rd. to add head-in parking, restroom facilities, bike racks, updated signs for maps and community postings, a freeze-proof drinking fountain and a fishing pier. Crews will also lower the trail along the river, providing a more intimate connection with the river and a safer experience for users traveling underneath University Dr. and Rogers Rd.

“Working with our respected partner, the Tarrant Regional Water District, the area was recognized as having the amazing potential to set the standard as a riverfront gathering place for trail users and families alike,” said Streams and Valleys Executive Director Adelaide Leavens. “We are also very thankful to have received a grant from the Crystelle Waggoner Trust that helped us deliver this fantastic amenity to the community.”

The trailhead informally known as “The Hoffbrau Trailhead” will be given the official name of “Waggoner Trailhead” and will better serve the growing population of people who live near and visit that part of the trail.

“The project along Rogers Road is only one example of the many projects yet to come as a part of the TRV Neighborhood & Recreation Enhancement Plan,” said Jim Oliver, General Manager of the Tarrant Regional Water District.

The Trinity River Vision Neighborhood and Recreation Enhancement Plan (NREP) is a partnered effort by the Tarrant Regional Water District, Streams and Valleys and the City of Fort Worth. The capital improvement plan will deliver over 90 projects inspired by users and neighborhood groups that will take the Trinity River in Fort Worth to a whole new level. The plan includes 35 miles of additional trails, sixteen new trailheads throughout the city, substantial upgrades to existing facilities, improved navigational signage and a recommendation to preserve 3,000 acres of dedicated open space.

Work on the Waggoner Trailhead and associated improvements are expected to continue until the end of the year. An alternate route will be suggested for trail users who need to cross University Dr. until construction in the area has been completed.



**New Models On View
At TRV Education Center**

Stop by the Trinity River Vision Project Education Center and view preserved sections of the football field-size model built to test and confirm engineering data that will be used to build the Central City Project bypass channel. An interactive kiosk that plays a nine minute documentary about the modeling effort is also a part of the display.

Currently, two pieces are on display at the center – a section of the urban edge of the bypass channel and a replica of the Fort Worth and Western Railroad bridge that extends along the West Fork of the Trinity. The railroad bridge display is intended to be a 'traveling display' and will be placed at several locations throughout the next year.




The Fort Worth and Western Railroad bridge exhibit

**Trinity River Vision in the Classroom:
UTA Grad Students Provide the
Project Team with a Fresh Perspective**

Graduate students from the University of Texas at Arlington participating in an urban planning studio just wrapped up a seven week project where they were asked to develop mock concepts for one of the Trinity Uptown canals.

The students were directed to incorporate amenities such as landscaping, a public plaza, and public walkways while taking into consideration technical constraints such as utility corridors, varying elevations, storm water needs and water quality.

Trinity River Vision Authority staff and other team members were involved throughout the process, providing students with real-life scenarios and challenges.

"This project allows the students to expand their skill set beyond an academic exercise by introducing a life-like project program, timeline, research and conceptualization goals and requirements," said Taner R. Özdil, Ph.D., ASLA, assistant professor at the UTA School of Architecture. "Students will also have a chance to present their work to a group of stakeholders in a creative and collaborative environment and perhaps influence future decisions concerning the project."

At the end of the project, students presented their work to a group of project team members who selected first, second and third place winners.
